What does a local skating club do?

Normal business

- Buying weekly fixed hours at the nearest oval
- Organizing skating lessons for kids and adults at the oval
- Organizing skating games and races for kids at the oval
- Put a field in the village under 20 cm of water, in hope for a cold winter



Special business

- Some clubs arrange a "temporarily artificial ice oval" in their village during December and January, often sponsored by local companies
- Open the local field with lights, music and "koek en zopie" when ice >6 cm
- Sweep and mark a tour on lakes and canals near the village when there is natural ice >12 cm
- Organize skating travels to plogade banor in Europe (for instance Weissensee, Runn, Luleå, Kuopio, Lipno, ...)

You may have heard of the Elfstedentocht

But that is not a "local" skating club, it is an (inter)national institute

- The Friesche Elfsteden Vereniging organizes the Elfstedentocht
- The Elfstedentocht is a skating track on lakes and canals, connecting 11 towns in the province of Friesland
- At 6:00 in the morning, a 200 km race for (semi) professional marathon skaters starts (track record 6h47m by Evert van Benthem)
- At 6:30 the same 200 km track is used for a recreational tour for 16.000 of the 32.000 members, starting 1000 people each 15 minutes
- Last time there was enough ice was January 4th, 1997
- In 1997 it was on TV in 32 countries, including CNN and Fox News





Dutch skating is different from Nordic skating

"I don't plurr, and if I do, there will be other people to save me"




no or almost no safety equipment everyone on speed skates safety = always lots of people on the ice club tour = marked track on prepared ice "Someone might plurr, so we are prepared to save him/her"




everyone has safety equipment everyone on nordic skates organized group with leader(s) and ice knowledge no marked tracks on the ice

Winter starts with snow






First strokes in Holland

The HLSK message is the same everywhere

- The Dutch system, waiting for thick ice and approval by local clubs, is a good system and Holland should keep on doing this
- HLSK imported an alternative system, the Swedish way, by skating in small groups with preparation, ice knowledge, equipment and leaders
- A 'waaghals' (våghals) is someone who does neither the Dutch, nor the Swedish way. For instance: someone skating without preparation, equipment, ice knowledge or company

And when we get enough time in the media, we explain our equipment, precautions, leader system and sometimes some ice facts



Now it is kärnis!

Thursday February 11th. While the first Dutch skaters mostly stick to the snöis parts where HLSK skated the last few days, our members try the first kärnis. With success! Thin, but ok to skate. Veluwemeer in Flevoland is one of the hotspots.




... or we go to newly made nature areas that are not discovered yet....






First time for me to plan with help of Sentinel2 in Holland. We had all types of ice: vrakis, skravelis, tallriksis, snöis, kärnis.











Trying to estimate how wide the vrakisbälte is




We had to cross it anyway

European model 50 scenario's forecast of February 14th, 2021

When it starts thawing in The Netherlands:

- the bad news is that ice degenerates fast. Much faster than in Sweden, due to more rain, more wind, higher temperatures and (on average) thinner ice when it starts thawing;
- the good news is that all Dutch skaters leave the ice immediately when it is +1. It is what everyone learns when you are young. It gives HLSK space to skate some more days without thousands of people on the ice;
- the frost seldom returns for a second period. At least, that has not been the case in 'skating' winters this century: 2003, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2017, 2021.
- Only in 2010 we had two periods of frost, one in January and one in February.
